#### Rheolau / Rules

- 1. All entries must have been made on the entry forms/sheet of paper and are to be in the hands of the Secretary no later than 10.15am. on morning of Show.
- 2. Staging of exhibits must be completed by 10.30am when judging will commence. Every effort will be made to open the tent to the public at 12.30pm if judging has been completed
- 3. All exhibits must be competitors' own work and no article should have been worn, laundered, bought or previously won a prize in the Cardigan Show. All exhibits in the Farm Produce and Vegetables Sections must be grown by the exhibitor.
- 4. Whilst every precaution will be taken to safeguard the exhibits, the Committee will not be held responsible for loss or damage.
- 5. Presentation of trophies, followed by the Raffle Draw, will take place in the Horticultural Tent at 4.00pm prompt.
- 6. Allocation of prize money on production of prize-winning cards at 4.15pm.
- 7. All goods must be collected between 4.30pm and 4.45pm as Stewards will NOT be on duty after this time.
- 8. The Judges' decision is final and they are empowered to withhold prizes when exhibits are considered unworthy.
- 9. Highest number of points: 1st 3 points, 2nd 2 points, 3rd 1 point. If two or more exhibitors have the same points score, the number of firsts will be used to decide the issue. In the event of a joint placing, each competitor will be allocated the full points.
- 10. Prizes in all classes: 1st £5, 2nd £3, 3rd £2. Children's section only (in classes with more than 10 entrants): 4th £1
- 11. Entries accepted in the Farm Produce, Vegetables, Fruit and Flowers Section on the morning of the show, up till 10 a.m., EXCEPT FLORAL ART when the closing date for FLORAL ART is Tuesday, 26th July, 2022.
- 12. The Society will not in any case, or under any circumstances hold itself responsible for any loss, damage, misdelivery, illness or accident, that may occur through or to any exhibit, trade stand or person from any cause whatsoever, and it shall hold the Society harmless and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from any of the above named circumstances.
- 13. The marquee will be open on Friday night from 2.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m. for competitors who wish to stage their exhibits.

Ingredients for the brioche dough – 500g strong white bread flour, plus extra for dusting, 25g caster sugar, 1 tsp fine sea salt, 7g fast action dried yeast, 250ml whole milk, 2 large eggs, 100g unsalted butter, diced, room temperature Ingredients for the Filling – 30g unsalted butter, 150g full fat cream cheese,

240g raspberry jam

Ingredients for the Glaze and decoration – 30g unsalted butter, 2tbsp lemon juice, 1tsp vanilla paste, pinch of sea salt, 225g icing sugar (sifted), freeze dried or fresh raspberries (crumb), edible flowers

Tin – 23cm x 33cm / 9 x 13 inch - lined with parchment

Method – For the dough: Place the flour, sugar, salt and yeast into the bowl of an electric stand mixer with the dough hook attachment and mix together only to combine. Pour in the milk and eggs and mix together to form a 'shaggy dough' then on low to medium speed, knead for 10-15 minutes until smooth and elastic. With the mixer running slowly, add the butter- a couple of pieces at a time- working it into the dough. Knead for a further 10-15 mins until smooth and elastic and you will see it pulling away from the sides of your mixing bowl. Tip the dough into a large, lightly greased bowl, cover with clingfilm and pop into the fridge overnight (for at least 8 hours). Roll out the chilled dough on a lightly floured surface into a rectangle measuring approx 40x50cm/16x20cm. Beat the cream cheese and butter together to make the filling and spread over the dough. Spread the jam evenly on top of the cream cheese. Starting from the long edge, tightly roll up the dough into a long sausage, then cut into 12 equal sized slices and place cut- side up in the lined tin. Cover them with clingfilm and leave to prove in a warm place for 45-60 minites OR until the rolls are all touching each other and also feel puffy to the touch.

Preheat oven to 190 deg C / 375 deg F / Gas Mark 5. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until golden brown. Set aside whilst you make the glaze.

Glaze Method – Place the butter, lemon juice, vanilla and salt in a small sauceoan over a medium heat and stir together until everything has melted and you can see it starting to bubble. Remove from the heat and then stir in your sifted icing sugar until smooth. While the buns are still warm, brush the glaze all over the top of the buns.

Finish with a sprinkling of freeze dried raspberry crumb and colourful edible flowers.

Storage – These can be stored in an airtight container for up to 3 days.

#### Statement for Show Schedules

An exhibit is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified in a show schedule.

NAFAS Rules state that disqualification will take place for the following reasons:

- ★ Failure to comply with any specific requirements of a class as stated in a show schedule, e.g. the measurements or the components.
- ★ Inclusion of fresh material that does not have roots or the cut ends of stems in water or water-retaining material.
  - **Exceptions:** Air plants, cactii, fruits, grass turf, lichen, moss, succulents, vegetables and long-lasting plant material (including strong fibrous stems) WHICH WILL REMAIN TURGID FOR THE DURATION OF THE SHOW.
  - (Definition of 'turgid': the state of firmness of plant tissue resulting from adequate moisture, causing the plant cells to be fully expanded).
- ★ Inclusion of artificial plant material (unless specifically allowed by a show schedule).
- An exhibit is composed of natural plant material with or without accessories. Natural plant material is any vegetable matter. It includes fresh, dried, garden, wild or made up plant material flowers, foliage, fruit, vegetables and seaweed. All may be additionally coloured.
- A Perpetual Cup [No. 54] is given in memory of Gill Hobby; also £15 will be given by Mrs Celia Evans to the competitor with the highest number of points in the Floral Art Show.
